KENYA | UGANDA

SECURITY OVERVIEW

The Interior Principal Secretary has <u>launched</u> the Kenya Coordinated Border Management Program (KCBMP) aimed at strengthening national border security.

Kenya in unanimity with 14 other member states under the Regional Centre on Small Arms (RECSA) will present a joint position on Small Arms and Light Weapons at the Fourth Review <u>Conference</u> in New York in June this year. The conference aims to address the challenges posed by the proliferation of small arms and light weapons in the Great Lakes and Horn of Africa region, in line with the UN Programme of Action on Small Arms and Light Weapons.

Interior Cabinet Secretary Kithure Kindiki said Security agencies are prioritising <u>intelligence-led</u> security operations to deal with terrorism and banditry. The CS said that the new shift has assisted the operations to preempt and thwart attacks as opposed to reactive operations.

Over 1000 families were displaced in Baringo amidst Banditry attacks. Bandit activities have <u>increased</u> in Samburu, West Pokot, Baringo and Elgeyo Marakwet counties in the past month.

Crime Trends Nairobi

Nairobi continues to experience a spike in Crime with the numbers almost doubling in the first week of March with 66 incidents reported this week compared to last week's 39. Kasarani, Embakasi North and Embakasi South, areas recorded the highest number of offences. The increase in the overall crime in Nairobi is a sign that crime is returning to an upward trend, highlighting the need for the police to put more efforts on prevention to change this trend.



INCEL

Theft was the most prevalent and reported crime in Week 1 with a total of 16 thefts cases reported compared to last week's three (3). Theft of properties including mobile phones and motorbikes was common in Kasarani and Langata areas.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

ARMED ROBBERY

Robberv incidences in Nairobi increased from three (3) cases to (12) this week. The robbery incidents were highest in Embakasi Central areas that include Kayole. As noted, the offenders who are mainly armed use violence to physically immobilize. intimidate. control and victims before robbing them.



MUGGING





MOB JUSTICE

Crime Trends Countrywide HOMICIDE

This week, there were 25 homicides cases, an increase from last week's 21. Compared to the rest of the counties, the homicide rates were relatively high in Nairobi, with most of the cases arising from quarrels, revenge, or loss of temper.

The total number of arrested persons across the country reduced slightly from 37 arrests to 21 this week. Violent offenses such as homicides, armed robberies and muggings made up the highest number of arrests this week, while lowlevel offenses such as drug abuse, violations and disorderly conduct accounted for fewer of arrests reported. THEFT

Thefts across the country increased from seven (7) cases last week to 21 this week. According to police reports, majority of the theft incidents reported were motivated by the desire of the offenders to obtain money or valuables from victims.

- Imagine you're walking home after a fun night out, but a strange feeling creeps in. That's your gut instinct telling you something's off. **Listen to it!**
- Walking alone at night? Team up with a friend or let someone know your route. There's safety in numbers, and knowing people are looking out for you is a great comfort.
